## Teamwork: With God as Your Partner

*And there was no day like that before it or after it, when the Lord listened to the voice of a man; for the Lord fought for Israel (Joshua 8:14).*

It was only noon, and Joshua was having a very long day! It began about 30 hours earlier when a breathless runner stumbled into Israel's camp at Gilgal. His message: *A coalition led by the five kings of the Amorites has laid siege to the city of Gibeon. They are going to "teach Gibeon a lesson" for breaking ranks and aligning with Israel. Gibeon will be no match for this overwhelming force unless their new ally, Israel, answers their SOS.*

To Joshua's mind, the action of the five kings was a critical blunder (on their part) and a strategic opportunity (for him). The prospect of conquering the five walled cities of the Amorites in the hill country looked like a long and grizzly business. But now the armies of the five cities, including the army of Jerusalem, had left the safety of their walled defenses to take to the field. If Joshua could meet them on the field before they returned to their cities, he could do in a day what would otherwise take many weeks and lives.

Joshua sprang into action. He assembled the army of Israel for a stealth march under the cover of night. As they moved silently through the darkness, Joshua heard a voice outlining the necessary battle plan. It was God who spoke and informed Joshua, "Do not fear them, for I have given them into your hands; not one of them shall stand before you." So, this would be a battle that involves pursuing an enemy in retreat. When the morning sun rose behind their backs, Israel saw complete shock illumined on the faces of five armies.



The day of battle began with open field combat at Gibeon. With God's assistance, Israel promptly seized the upper hand and began paring away at their confused opponents. When it became obvious to the five kings that remaining on the field would lead to the total loss of their armies, they sounded the retreat. God slowed the retreating armies by providing a killer hail-storm at the descent of Beth-horon as Israel took up the pursuit.

So it was that Joshua found himself facing a dilemma at high noon. Despite his fatigue, he knew that Israel needed to finish the job TODAY! Once the five armies (or what was left of them) reached the safety of their walled cities, even a remnant could defy Israel with impunity. So Joshua made an audacious request of the God who promised him success in the day's battle. He asked God to make this a 48-hour day. The rest of the story you know well!

So what's the point? God had a job for Joshua and all that was required was faithfulness and trust. God supplied

what was missing to transform Joshua's faithfulness into unbelievable effectiveness. Look at all that God supplied: A key window of opportunity, timely information, encouragement and critical battle field intelligence, cosmic reinforcements (hailstones to die for!), and a supernatural day in which a man could accomplish what would otherwise require two.

The story turned out this way because Joshua did two things: He was doggedly determined to follow through with what God asked and was audacious enough to ask God to supply what he lacked. Our God is the same God who heard and answered Joshua's prayer. So commit to do whatever He asks of you and then pray for Him to supply what you lack to complete it. He can give you whatever is needed, including a single day in which you accomplish the work of two, if you will ask!

We think of the Gospel as the good news of our future and unending life with the One who created us. We tend to be concerned for others in this same regard. But this is only the icing on the cake of what we call our redemption. The cake is the fact that this good news Gospel affects each of us in the here and now! Not only does this good news offer a past of forgiveness and understanding a future of eternity with our Creator, but this good news speaks to a life (**right now**)—of Christ living in us and meeting all of our needs right now!<sup>2</sup> When we truly ponder this significance it leads to worship!

Worship is the theme of our Annual Global Missions Conference. There are as many God-given ways to worship as there are languages and cultures. This year we are focusing on ethnodoxology. “Ethnodoxology studies how different cultures worship God. It includes all the arts such as dance, drama, video and visuals. And it goes beyond worship as an event because it studies how worship shapes or is shaped

by life as lived within a culture or ethnic group.”<sup>3</sup>

February 19–26 two speakers, Roger Lowther and Frank Fortunato, will speak about how the arts fuel worship and how worship fuels missions, or the cross-cultural proclamation of the Gospel. We will host some of our own Missionaries and National Partners during this time. There will be opportunities for you to meet and hear from them. Event details and specific times are included in this newsletter.

Since June 2022 I've had the privilege of joining our First Evan Global Missions Team (GMT). The GMT exists with many functions but with this encompassing pattern of effort: to mobilize, support, encourage, equip and enable ourselves and others in the promotion of this Gospel cross-culturally.

Membership on this board is a 3-year commitment with approximately 1/3 of the members rolling off (and on) each year. This strategy allows fresh faces and perspectives each year while preserving consistency and tradition. Speaking of tradition, our First Evan

mission strategy is guided by a mission policy document that although updated as needed to meet changing times, was originally crafted many years ago. It was originated to establish a vision for missions with a focus that has remained a mainstay and imperative for our church for many years. 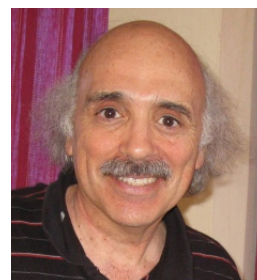

# OUTREACH

## Q/A: A Tool for Your Faith and Mission

This is the first of a number of articles in the newsletter to equip you for when you encounter hard questions. It isn't meant to be bulletproof, but helpful food for thought.

**Q:** How could a good and loving God allow evil?

**A:** That's a good question.

WE may not know why God allows evil, but HE knows why and He uses it to accomplish good purposes for His children. For example, Joseph was wrongfully sold into slavery and falsely imprisoned. In the end, he told his brothers, "As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today" (Gen. 50:20). The evil that God allowed in Joseph's life led to Joseph being able to save starving nations. The greatest example was that God paid for the sin of the world through Jesus who was falsely accused and died on a cross.

God could have made a world without evil. Instead, He created a world where love is meaningful because the choice to not love is an option. God intended that people would choose to love Him and others willingly, and not robotically.

Our hearts instinctively tell us that there is something off because of the presence of evil. The gravity of evil sometimes makes us question, "Why?" What is not a mystery is that God never approves of evil. He despises it. The Bible teaches us that God's initial design existed without it and that Jesus is coming back to restore all things. He also promises that a day is coming when "he will repay each person according to what he has done" (Matthew 16:27). For the perpetrator, this is a solemn warning. For the brokenhearted, this is an encouragement!

However, a logical answer cannot heal a broken heart. If we are talking about your painful experience, may we listen, pray, and care for you?
