
Lost-Cause Worship by Pastor Jim Fleming

But He said, "The things that are impossible with people are possible with God" (Luke 18:27).

1967: I was a teenager at the time and had been invited by a friend to hear about an exciting business opportunity. The speaker began the evening by having us dream of what we could do with \$10,000, \$50,000, or \$100,000. When our dreaming had been properly stoked, he told us how Amway could make our dreams a reality.

"Mr. Amway" was counting on the fact that most (all?) people fantasize about receiving (and spending) a financial windfall. We do this because we see the inherent power of money. We appreciate its ability to accomplish grand and desirable things. Jesus' perspective on money is profoundly different. He knows that wealth has tremendous power, but it is a power with great potential for hurt and harm.

When Jesus declared, "The things that are impossible with people are possible with God," the relevant topic was the negative potential of wealth. He had just boldly declared, "How hard it is for those who are wealthy to enter the kingdom of God!" (Luke 18:24). Wealth is a powerful disincentive for allegiance to Jesus. Other passages (like 1 Timothy 6:17) tell us why: A wealthy man easily




attributes his success to himself and finds his security in his stuff. He is naturally blinded to the fact that true success and security are always and only found in God.

This "power of wealth" is so potent, so persuasive, that saving a wealthy man is almost a lost cause. The power of wealth is great enough to push from a man's grasp even the kingdom of God. So when Jesus is talking about the God who accomplishes the impossible, what He has in mind is something truly amazing, the grand miracle of wealthy men receiving a Savior.

This is precisely what gives the Zacchaeus incident its poignancy. Luke tells us this tax collector is rich, but not beyond the reach of God's abilities. Jesus says of him in Luke 19:9, "Today

salvation has come to his house." When Jesus declared that He must dine with Zach, it was because a miracle of the highest order was on the menu.

So recognize this! In comparison to most people in the world, we are unimaginably wealthy. But God's ability to save is greater than the power of our stuff to ensnare. So when we gather to worship, we ought to sing with impossibly grand passion, because we are the lost-causes. We are the ones who would be beyond rescue except for one simple fact: God is able to do the impossible. We worship the God who has saved us. The fact that we are able to do so is TRULY a miracle!



Rounding Home



Praying Along the Path by Ken Eriksen, Vice Chairman of the Session and Chairman of the Transition Committee

It was Sunday night, and several of us were having dinner in the cafeteria at Washington State University. We were sharing what we heard in sermons that day or experienced that weekend at a men's retreat. One person shared how he was moved to pray. Another added that there is a need to pray. And someone else said we need to pray together. Others chimed in saying we have lots to pray about, let's meet in my dorm, on Tuesday nights, so on and so forth. We came together each Tuesday, praying for each other, the gospel to go out, for our churches, and our campus. Prayer moved us together and closer to God. Prayer was what we needed, and for those whom we prayed. Prayer moved us into action.



Returning to the book of Nehemiah as we have in previous Shepherd's Staff articles, we see the Israelites were moved to prayer. They had just finished rebuilding the wall around Jerusalem, celebrated God's provisions and read from the Book of the Law. From the ninth and tenth chapters in particular, the leadership of the Israelites called the people to "Stand up and bless the LORD your God from everlasting to everlasting." The leaders then prayed unto God, and from that prayer Israel *consecrated* God (remembered all that He did for their forefathers and themselves), *confessed* their sins and made a *covenant* to observe and do all the commandments of God. Prayer moved the Israelites into action.

For me, those weeks, months, and years praying with my friends at WSU had a profound impact on my prayer life. As I was nearing graduation, and looking where God wanted me to move and work, it became abundantly clear I was to move to Washington, D.C. to prayer walk. So, I moved to Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., and walked the city, around the Capitol, the Supreme Court, the federal agencies, lobbyist offices, and the White House, praying for those in leadership and for our country. Prayer moved me into action.

Since our transition began in March 2021, many of you have told us that you have been moved to pray for First Evan, its leadership and staff, and the Pastoral Search Committee. Your prayers have been heard, and they have been and are being answered. The elders had a season of prayer, culminating by praying together on behalf of First Evan. Since then, there have been many prayer gatherings for our transition, including the *Sunday Prayer Focus*, dedicated to our season of transition. Prayer moves us into a position of humility unto the Father, and is our chief weapon against the enemy, the devil. Prayer propels us along the path.

We encourage you to continue praying for our *six challenges*: Give Grace, Preserve Unity, Stand Strong, Impart a Godly Legacy, Seek the Lost, and Work Smart. We especially ask you to pray for our *Pastoral Search Committee* (Eric Fuhrman, Chairman, Kevin Weaver, Chris Cannon, Ralph Hughes, Jim Graham, Debbie Frazier, and Katelynn Bernardini), for their stamina, protection, unity, and wisdom. And pray for our staff and congregation that we would persevere along the path doing the work at First Evan, "to glorify Jesus Christ and magnify His gospel in all of life until He comes."


May we be a church that *consecrates* God, *confesses* sin, and *covenants* to following Him.

Memphis Ministries Team launched a new FEC partnership this year with ARISE2Read. Several First Evan members had already been volunteering with the program as reading tutors when Balmoral Ridgeway, a neighbor to FEC, asked for the reading program and the optional after school Bible club last fall.

Alyson Riggs, Mae Sistrunk, and Stephanie Moore led the Bible club which grew to over 25 children. We journeyed through the Bible using the same curriculum as our children's ministry, weaving the gospel into each lesson. As the children became more comfortable, they began to ask many questions about God, the Bible, and the gospel. We saw the great benefit in having the availability of enough volunteers to engage in small group and individual conversations. To cap off our Bible club, we ended the year with a review of what we had learned and a party where the kids had fun drawing sidewalk chalk pictures of their favorite lessons.

One of the parents shared: "Thank you so much. My daughter loves this so much and I'm thankful that the school allowed Christ in the school as it makes a major difference. JaNiyah will definitely see you all next year."

Children are looking for identity, meaning, and community. A Tool for Your Faith and Mission

How do we know that our Bible accurately records what was originally written?

That's a good question. In the game of Telephone, one person whispers a phrase to someone, then this person whispers to the next, and so on until the last person blurts out the message. The original message is often comically twisted by the end. Skeptics assume that the lost in translation during Telephone occurred to the Bible.

However, the Jewish oral tradition wasn't like playing Telephone. They were an oral culture that regularly and meticulously memorized and recited scripture. Accuracy seriously mattered when it came to God's words. Further, they scrupulously wrote hand-written copies of the originals. Although we don't have the originals, we have over 5600 written copies, some as early as the second century, of the New Testament originals. Sure, the manuscripts have variations between them; but 99 percent of these differences can be explained as copying errors and none of them affect our understanding of any core doctrine (Mounce, 141; Windle, 2019). The accuracy of the original content was meticulously preserved... but could the original writers be trusted?

Yes! The New Testament authors were either eyewitnesses or close to the eyewitnesses of Jesus. One author shared that his report could be fact-checked by over 500 other eyewitnesses (1 Corinthians 15:3-8). In addition, these writers faced tragic losses, even death, for holding onto their message. If they had written lies, the writers could recant them and save themselves. But there were no lies to take back. They simply shared what they saw Jesus do and heard Him say. And they didn't flinch even when their testimony cost them their lives.

The Apostle Paul explained that the Bible is God-breathed or inspired by God (2 Timothy 3:16). This means that God used human writers to reveal His truth through them. When we consider that the original eyewitness messages were preserved over 2000 years, through oral and written transmission, despite persecution, their preservation shouts God's desire to share His true words to all nations throughout all generations. God's word has been reliably recorded. Trust it!




