#### Lifeline! by Pastor Jim Fleming

"Nevertheless, the Lord your God was not willing to listen to Balaam, but the Lord your God turned the curse into a blessing for you because the Lord your God loves you" (Deuteronomy 23:5).

Why does God allow suffering? If God really loved us, wouldn't He keep bad things from happening to us? God's detractors like to ask these things—usually as a justification for doubting God's goodness and questioning His existence.

Moses has an answer. As Israel prepared to enter into the Promised Land, Moses gave a riveting speech in which he recalled Israel's experiences with God in the wilderness. One incident that came up for review was the Balaam debacle (detailed in Numbers 22–24). The brief reference (in Deuteronomy 23:5) to this incident communicates volumes to those who want to use their encounters with evil to call God on the carpet.

Let's get this straight on the front end. God **could** have created a world in which there was no suffering. But the cost of such a creation would be the absence of free will. Adam and Eve could have been created in such a way that they had **no choice** but to obey God. They would never have eaten the forbidden fruit, sin would not have entered the world, and all the pain and heartache that sin produces would not have been unleashed on humanity.

But God chose, instead, to give Adam and Eve a choice. It would seem that God prefers the devotion of those who choose Him more than the "love" of those who cannot do otherwise, even though His preference introduces a risk factor: Those who are devoted to God because they choose to be can also choose **not** to be.

Sin entered planet earth in Eden, and pain and suffering have been the result. This fact does not tell us about God's love, but God's desire to be loved by choice. The Balaam Factor, however, tells us all we need to know about the love of God in a sin-driven world. The Balaam Factor assures us: God's love will not insulate us from curses, but it moves God to turn curses into blessings!

Moses is saying that, because of God's love for Israel, He turned bad into fuel for good. This principle is reiterated in the New Testament (Romans 8:28 and James 1:2-3 come to mind) and connects to all who know Jesus. As long as we live in a world of sin, we will not be insulated from suffering. But God loves us and will convert the bad things that happen to us into something beneficial. God will use bad to promote our best.

The only question worth asking in the face of trial is, "Do you believe Him?" Do you believe God is able to use "disasters" and disappointments; pain and persecution; suffering and sickness to produce good things in your life? If you will believe this (It **IS** the truth!), then you can respond to



every set-back with joy and gratefulness. Whatever is weighing on your heart right now, God will use it as a source of blessing in your life. Trust Him. He loves you! That's all you need to know. This unassailable fact is your lifeline.

# Shepherding Council to Strengthen Care of Members by Steve Boyd and Taylor Park, Shepherding Council

"Shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but eagerly; not domineering over those in your charge, but being examples to the flock." (1 Peter 5:2-3)

Peter exhorts the elder community of his scattered audience to shepherd the flock entrusted to them. To shepherd intentionally, willingly and humbly. Our shepherd group at First Evan desires to be like those faithful shepherds Peter describes. We regularly want to evaluate and strengthen our efforts in shepherding and caring for members-especially coming out of the pandemic, we must assess and make needed adjustments. The Session has charged the new Shepherd Council (SC) to come alongside our existing shepherds to determine the best plans for member support, personal growth, and outreach.

**First Priority:** Two immediate priorities surfaced from the recently conducted interviews of members and regular attenders.

- 1) Becoming intentional and proactive in the area of outreach which will eventually make its way into our shepherding priorities with the work Steven Yeo is doing.
- 2) Many connected to First Evan do not have a close connection to their shepherd. Therefore, the Shepherding Council will see that:

"Everyone who names First Evan as home should be the recipient of proactive and informed prayer, growth assistance, and personal ministry guidance from a shepherd they know and trust as they do life together."

**Structure of Shepherding Ministry:** Our ministry is structured into three tiers:

- 1) **The Shepherding Council** serves under the session seeking to come alongside existing shepherds to communicate, support, equip, and encourage. Steve Boyd chairs this group with Taylor Park as staff advisor.
- 2) **Shepherds**—the backbone of our ministry. The shepherd's primary role is to provide that "proactive and informed prayer, growth assistance, and personal ministry guidance". Where possible, little disruption of existing relationships is intended. The goal is to strengthen and reinforce, not replace.
- 3) **Shepherding Assistants** will assist the Shepherding Elders where sheer numbers or particular needs warrant additional support.

Confirming My Shepherding Elder:

The interviews indicated many are not sure who their official Shepherding Elder is. Every member should have an assigned Shepherding Elder. However, as we are updating our records and confirming the status of some of our Shepherds, a few of these assignments may be changing. If you have a TouchPoint account, you can find your Elder under the "Involvements" tab. Jacki Stieferman (istieferman@firstevan.org) would also be happy to assist you.

#### A COMMITMENT TO SPEAK GRACE

#### Transition Challenge

Last Spring, we embraced six key challenges we are facing as a church. The first challenge is captured in this two-word command: "Give grace." God wants us to speak in ways that give grace to those who hear (Ephesians 4:29).

So this summer, our pastoral staff gave us a key mission briefing in a sermon series titled, "Graces of Reconciliation." We learned that God has given us grace that equips us to, in turn, give grace gifts to others. These gifts can be conveyed when we say something as simple as: "I did what was wrong," "I forgive you," "I want to become a better person in Christ," and "Here's what you need to know."

If you were in the worship service on August 14, you received a card titled "A Commitment to Speak Grace." At the end of the service, Pastor Fleming explained how this card can be used as a tool for the next 30–60 days. (Don't have a card? Pick one up at the Welcome Center.)

- 1. Several times each week, read through this card.
- 2. Ask the Lord to identify any ways in which you need to take action.
- 3. Use confession, forgiveness, teachability, or exhortation as God prompts you. If this means reaching out to someone to reconcile, go for it.
- 4. Once you have acted on what God has prompted you to do, write the date and a one or two sentence summary of what you did on the back of this card.
- 5. Hang on to your card and keep using it.

In a month or so, we would like to gather as a congregation to encourage one another by sharing some tales of grace. Between now and then, keep working at applying what we have learned about how to speak grace to one another.

Don't let this sermon series go to waste by just doing the usual. (Need a refresher—*click here*.) Make what we have been taught live in your words and action.



# Tlapaneco Indian Ministries, Inc. by Hickman Ewing

First Evangelical Church has partnered with the Gospel ministry work among the Tlapaneco Indians of Guerrero state, Mexico, for over 80 years. Mr. H.V. Lemley married Mildred Lewis at First Evan in October of 1939, and they went directly to work in a remote region of this tribe. When Mrs. Lemley went to be with the Lord in 1972, Ruben Gaytan became Mr. Lemley's "Timothy," and together they carried on the ministry. When Mr. Lemley went to be with the Lord in 1993, Ruben became the Director of the ministry. In 1997 he married Leticia Aguilar, missionary and grandaughter of the first Tlapaneco convert to Christ, and together they have carried on the ministry. There are now many Tlapaneco believers, some 50 churches and missions, and approximately 45 full-time ministry workers.

In July, Ricky Varela and Hickman Ewing traveled to the city of Tlapa, Mexico, for the annual Pastors and Leaders Conference, held at the Center/Bible Tlapaneco Christian School. This was the first such inperson conference since the summer of 2019, due to COVID. About 100 pastors, female missionaries, translators, and church leaders attended. First Evan has typically supplied the main speaker for this conference every other year (i.e. 2015 Pradip A., 2017 Seth Stevens, 2019 Ron Man). This year Hickman was the principal speaker on the subject of "Unity." Ricky led the devotional times each morning (beginning at 7:00 a.m.). One of the highlights each day was the worship and singing of hymns and songs from noon to 1:00 p.m. daily. It was encouraging to see the young male Bible school students playing their guitars and leading the singing.

It was a time of mutual encouragement and learning, focusing on our oneness as believers in Christ. Jesus prayed the night before He went to the cross that His then disciples (and those of us who would believe in the future) would be one, even as the Father and the Son are (John 17:21). We considered John 13–17 (and many other New Testament texts), including Jesus' command to love one another. How do we show love? Warren Wiersbe (who spoke at First Evan years ago) wrote: "Lest that important admoni-

















tion be received in a vague fashion, it is fleshed out by a couple of dozen additional 'one another' statements that further explain what Christian love really is." It was so touching every morning, before the 7:00 a.m. devotional, to see each of the 100 believers present "greeting" each and every other believer individually with a handshake and a hearty "buenas dias" or "wah-sot-low" (good morning in the Tlapaneco language).

On the final day we participated in the Bible School graduation service. Ricky and Hickman awarded the diplomas, Hickman gave a message from 1 Peter 1 on our calling, and Ricky prayed a prayer of consecration for these new pastors.

Ricky and Hickman also met for some 4+ hours with the Tlapaneco Christian Churches (ICT) Board of directors, which consists of seven pastors (Emanuel, Abel, Roberto, Timoteo, Felix, Tanis, and Moises], and Ruben.

Though this tribe is now "reached" in a missiological sense, the vast majority of the approximately 200,000 Tlapaneco people do not know our Jesus personally—many still clinging to their ancient pagan custom of sacrificing to the rain god. Please continue to pray for our brothers and sisters in Christ as they take the good news of the Gospel to their people, often in the face of much opposition and persecution. They send their warmest greetings and thanks for the ongoing partnership with and support of First Evan.
